


As I put pen to paper once again, the Committee are in the throes of clearing up from the aftermath of this year's annual Open Day which was held on Sunday 10th August. It was touch and go whether the event would take place at all, as at 10am on that Sunday morning, a handful of us were in the shed debating whether we should cancel the whole thing! Some of us were already soaked to the skin and after the final decision was made around mid-day to go for it, the show was set up in record time with Paula at the helm directing where gazebos and people should be placed etc. etc. The event was scaled down a little and the area of activities was consolidated around the shed area, but the most important thing was not to disappoint the public, should anyone dare to venture out into what has so far, felt like the most drenching day of the year!

This event, although 'on site' still involves an awful lot of organisational input. We rely heavily once again on the generosity of our tenants, who give not only their time both before and on the day, but who also donate their surplus crops and make wonderful cakes, jams, crumbles and chutneys for us to sell. The visiting public amazingly and thankfully are more than happy to queue up to buy our fresh and home-made produce.

Each year, we try to add to the 'interest' factor, although from the feedback we get, some of our visitors have returned to see us each year since the idea of an Open Day was first suggested way back in 2004. They visit simply to savour the general ambiance and atmosphere of a vibrant and yet relaxed and friendly Association fortunate enough to be situated in the idyllic valley known as the Odibourne Allotments. Our 'Count how many Scarecrows you can find' competition idea has always added that fun element for the children. Our total takings for that very first event were minimal compared to today's amounts, but this first modestly successful event spurred us on to build on that experience as we had very little in the way of funds in the pot at that time. We have from day one always invited the Town's current Mayor and made a donation from our takings to his or her chosen Charity. This in turn has helped us to build good relationships with our landlords at the Town Council. With the addition of the tea tent shortly after that first event, our takings increased and the people of Kenilworth have enjoyed many a relaxing cuppa and piece of home-made cake at a fraction of the cost of any town venues. Our most daring venture so far has been a Pimm's tent, which has added just a little extra 'fun' element to the day in more ways than one. It depends on whether you have a Pimms or two either before or after you try to negotiate the stepping stones to get to the other side of the river as to whether you finish up with wet feet and soggy sandals for the rest of the day! Needless to say the stepping stones were 'out of bounds' at this year's event! Our latest addition was to have been an ice cream cart. At the moment this is still a 'work in progress' idea, but we improvised for this year and sold ice cream from a cold box and it worked!

We are also grateful to those tenants who have generously and spontaneously set up their own side attractions. The public have been known to hurtle through our gates and race straight round to Hanif's plot to buy his delicious spicy samosas before he sells out. Chris and Nick have always brought an active demonstration beehive to the site. Unfortunately, this had to be cancelled due to the weather conditions. John and Mary (sadly retiring in September) have frequently organised 'guess the weight/length/ number' type competitions and Harvey has always come up trumps with something to raise not only some cash, but a smile with his fun ideas and banter. WHERE HAS THIS YEAR GONE?......

INTRODUCING NEW FRIENDS / JUDGES OF OUR BEST PLOT COMPETITION

Owing to the problems that Moreton Morrell/Pershore/Mid Warwickshire colleges are having, our regular judges of many years standing could not help us this year. We were fortunate enough however to have two extremely well qualified judges who were equally as thorough and they willingly took over the reins and did a superb job for us. Because of the extremely high standard, our pre-judging threw up many more plots to be assessed than usual, which in turn meant that the judges had to return a few days later to complete the task. The results have been posted on all of our notice boards, see also page 3. Congratulations to all.

We are so grateful to Sarah Ridgeway BSc (Hons) MI Hort., from Hinton's Nurseries and her colleague, Botanist, Dr Barry Meatyard. Sarah will be offering some special discounts for our members (we will forward this information to everyone via our notice boards as soon as we have the details). Dr Barry Meatyard is also Chairman of the Guys Cliffe Walled Garden Trust. If you have read the notice boards, there is more detail about the Trust and the diversity of help needed, but briefly a group of volunteers are attempting to restore the kitchen garden at Guys Cliffe, which is thought to have been in existence since the mid 1700's, It supplied Guys Cliffe House for over 200 years. New notices will be going up shortly for new dates of volunteer work parties and it is hoped that some of us may want to get involved in the conservation and restoration work. Help with marketing, graphic design and artwork, fundraising and IT is also needed and welcomed. JUDGE'S COMMENTS, AND A FEW OF OUR OWN!!!....

- 1. One very important observation on the Odibourne site came from Sarah when she observed that in general the site was suffering from a lack of nitrogen. Maybe the fact that the site has been intensely cultivated for almost 100 years means that we urgently need to replenish the ground in order to improve our crops.
- 2. Just about everyone missed out on the fact that water conservation also includes '*mulching*'. Good points were scored for those plots with water butts, but more could have been gained if mulching had also been used. There is also still a need for more water butts in general on site, especially where there are greenhouses on plots. Collected rain water is far better for crops than mains tap water.
- 3. We have noticed that many of our newer tenants are using mains water from the taps. <u>The taps are only to be</u> <u>used for filling up your kettles or spraying devices.</u> Please scoop water from the troughs to fill your watering cans. Two good reasons for doing this is that the water in the troughs is warmer and so will not 'shock' your plants. It is also more naturalised and better for the crops than direct from the tap.
- 4. Still on the subject of water. Please remember that no watering of plots is permitted with hosepipes. Hosepipes may only be used to refill water butts.
- Numbering of plots is sadly missing throughout and no matter how we nag everyone, it is still not happening. (easy points lost/gained)
- 6. Not all of us are hugely competitive and produce excellent crops regardless of any competitions. However easy marks can be lost/gained at judging time if crops are labelled. This helps the judges to award extra points for Winter crops where crop tops are similar (eg. young brassicas or young celeriac and parsnip tops).

SO WHAT ELSE HAVE WE BEEN UP TO THIS YEAR?

For many years, we have used both the Kenilworth Festival and Lions Shows as fund raising days, but at the start of the year, we were faced with the dilemma of the Kenilworth Festival moving to September, which was no good for our sales of young plants and rhubarb etc. Paula suggested that we tried taking a stand at the Foodie Fortnight event in Talisman Square in May in place of the Festival and it paid off. It was very successful and will be repeated again next year (so long as they don't decide to move that one around)

Our next 'outing' was to the good old reliable Lions Show in the Abbey Fields in June. What a fabulous day that was. The money raised between those events will be published in our accounts at the AGM (as well as our surprising takings from the almost cancelled Open Day)! Swiftly on the heels of the Lion's Show, our Beehive Hill site put itself firmly on the map when it opened its gates to the public in June alongside the beautiful gardens of Malthouse Lane, Fieldgate Lane and the surrounding areas as part of the National Open Gardens Scheme. The site had around 300 members of the public through its gates and all were most impressed with what they saw. People came from far and wide, not just locally. Those who were local and had just driven past on a daily basis said that they were aware that allotments existed behind the hedge, but were completely amazed at the quality of cultivation and neatness of layout and general upkeep of the site. The opening to the public of the Beehive Hill site has proved to be a good PR exercise. Credit to site reps Catherine and Keith and tenants alike for all their efforts to fly the flag on the day.

Our educational visits from local schools and nursery groups have been a regular feature on our calendar for numerous years now, and once again our many volunteers from amongst our tenants have been on hand to help us guide, advise and generally encourage these youngsters, possibly the young Allotmenteers of the future. Our young visitors include Brownies, Rainbows and the University crèche group, who have regular visits to their dedicated raised beds on the educational plot. Park Hill School (year 9) descended upon us (66 in all) in June. They were studying soil composition as part of their school curriculum and we were happy to help in a practical way. In July we had 33 children from their gardening club and we were able to help in a more relaxed way, even showing them a slow worm. The nursery group from St Nicholas school also visit Odibourne on a regular basis and frequent visits are made by St Augustine's school to our Beehive Hill site. The Beehive nursery was allocated a plot right next to their school in 2008 as soon as the site was opened. Education is high on our agenda. Many thanks to all those volunteers who regularly help with these visits

So all in all we've had a very busy year....and it's not over yet!
