



Since our last newsletter (August 2014).....

Our AGM took place on October 23rd 2014. A disappointingly small number of tenants attended and the following is a very much abbreviated version of that meeting:

AGM Thursday 23rd October 2014 at The Copper House Club (formerly The Royal British Legion Club)

The Chairman reported that it had been another challenging gardening year, but that in the main, good crops had been produced and all our events had been successful, both financially and from a PR point of view. Good relationships continued to be built with most local agencies. He thanked all the volunteers who had helped in maintaining this pleasing situation.

The Treasurer gave a full and comprehensive breakdown of expenditure and income. As agreed by Committee he had broken our funds into three designated areas, (1) A general fund for day to day running costs, (2) A fund designated for special projects ie building of a toilet block and (3) An contingency fund (for emergencies). He made clear that our healthy financial position was not from rent income, but from our efforts over the years in fund-raising events and from the income generated from shop sales and from re-cycling sales of sheds, greenhouses and sundry gardening items. Once again, he confirmed that there would be no rent increase for 2015/2016. A full and detailed financial report will be displayed within the Trading shed. He was thanked by the Chairman.

Any other business included the approach to the Lower Ladyes Hills side of Odibourne site. The difficult slope prohibited for example deliveries of manure to individual plots. Committee to discuss remedying this problem.

Presentation Evening on Friday November 14th 2014.....

Was a different kettle of fish altogether!!! It was almost standing room only at the Old Copper House Club. The event was extremely well attended and it was good to see and welcome so many youngsters allowed to be out late as it was a 'no school in the morning' night out! Although this Winter seems to have been rather a gloomy and long one, spirits were lifted at our first meeting of the New Year in more ways than one! Our shop volunteers are always invited to a pre-season meeting and drinks are with compliments from K.A.T.A. The meeting took place on Thursday 22nd January at the Old Copper House Club, the intention being to thank all those who give up part of their precious weekends to help run the shop for the benefit of our K.A.T.A. members. A detailed report of our previous years trading was presented by our Treasurer Mark and both Chairman Mike and Robin & Sue, our Shop Managers presided over the evening. Our volunteers make known their availability for the forthcoming year and are invited to propose ideas to improve both our service and stock for the benefit of our members, their families and friends. The following invitation/promo is from Sue and Robin:

We stock canes, netting, herbicides and pesticides and all sorts of gardening bits and pieces, all at very competitive prices. There's also the wonderful recycling corner – always well worth a look for a bargain, whether it's a lawnmower for £4.00, some beautiful clay pots in all shapes and sizes from £1.00 a pot, or a thing for putting things/compost/ stuff in- is it a wormery? Just arrived in our re-cycling corner......

A considerable amount of greenhouse glass – £2.00 per 2' square panes, £1.50 per 2'x18" panes. Odd 'end' shapes 50p small and £1.00 medium. An absolute bargain at roughly <u>half</u> the cost of new.

Also for your convenience and for the benefit of all.....

Another welcome addition is the delivery of well-rotted manure to two of our sites. This was delivered to Odibourne and Beehive Hill sites at the end of last year whilst the ground was still firm. A nominal charge of £2.00 per barrow load (to be paid into the shop please) is charged for the convenience of delivery to your site. The deliveries have stopped during the wet weather as the farmer cannot get his tractor into his fields, the ground now being too soft. As soon as the ground firms up, we will resume deliveries.

News from our three sites.....

Spring Lane

We all have to share our allotment sites with some form of wildlife, be-it slugs, pigeons and rabbits to foxes, moles, muntjack and badgers. Spring Lane suffers the most damage from badgers and legislation prevents us from using any forceful method to stop them. Therefore this year out of sheer frustration following crops confirmed as being dug up by them, Chris is going to erect some substantial fencing around the site to simply re-direct the badgers around the perimeter in the hope that they will no longer get onto the allotments.

Beehive Hill

A work party has cleared the overgrown plot 1, which was the redundant wheelchair user's plot. New plans for a plot for wheelchair users are being formulated for relocation to the Odibourne site for practical reasons. There is still a good amount of well-rotted woodchip at the rear of the Beehive site and anyone is welcome to help themselves. This could be used as mulch or for suppressing weeds or for paths. We ask for a donation of £1.00 per wheelbarrow full or bag your own using old redundant compost bags (to be paid into the shop please).

Keith and Catherine would like to convey their thanks to the willing helpers on the rota, which was set up to keep the main path well-trimmed. An excellent job is being done
