With temperatures starting to drop, and Autumn just beginning to creep in, we are inevitably coming to the end of another superb growing year on our allotments. Warmer temperatures and more prolonged wet spells seem to have agreed with most of our crops although some hard fruits, namely apples and plums were hit by the frosts earlier in the year, and did not set any fruit. Potato harvests have been good as well as soft fruits, but strangely, many have reported runner beans as being slow or frustratingly hard to germinate this year. Having finally caught up, they are now plentiful and succulent.

Plot changeovers have also slowed down and that was bound to happen at some point when lots of plots have been split and generally people have found that half plots are easier to manage so they don't become despondent and give up or are actually given notice for poor maintenance. We would urge anyone with a full plot primarily at Odibourne to let us know if they would like to downsize rather than battle on with a plot which is too big for them. This helps everyone in the long run, both those on the waiting list and those who are really struggling.

Sadly though, we have lost other tenants who have been poorly, and these have included Pete Reeve and Penny Mitchell from Odibourne and David Robbins from our Spring Lane site. Our condolences go to their families.

And it's been a joyous year for others, with little ones born to John and Jane Heyden, Leon and Amy Boneham and to Selvar and Liy all from Odibourne site, and a belated welcome to little Erin born to Anthony and Claire, who we missed out of our Spring newsletter and who is now expecting her own little brother or sister within a couple of months! Congratulations also to Helen and Louis who got married earlier this year and to our Chairman Chris, who married his partner of 30 years last month!...

One or two have made the observation quite rightly, that we do a pre-selection of the best plots in the immediate run up to the actual judging day, which is totally necessary, as our judge would be on site for days and nights if she had to whittle out every single plot in one go. This is a laborious task and we are grateful to Sue and Robin Ashby for doing this time consuming job for us. However, it may have caught some of you 'last minuters' out, as some leave weeding and labelling until the night before. Please note that the lion's share of marking is loaded onto the number of crops actually grown, so no amount of weeding and labelling will make that much difference if you only grow half a dozen crops. However in fairness to all, next year, we will announce a cut-off date for when the pre-selection deadline is due. And a little tip from the Judge: Extra 'water conservation marks' can be gained if you simply mulch your crops with eithergrass cuttings or wood chippings, the latter to be well rotted though. This prevents loss of water due to evaporation.

We are most grateful to Sarah Ridgeway from Hintons Nurseries who once again performed this much valued task for us.

And our Big Celebration BBQ....

Thank you to everyone who turned out to help us celebrate. We had thought that there might be around 200 tenants and invited guests, but there was well over that estimated number. Not a morsel of food or drink was left over!!! Thanks to everyone's support and to those who made it happen. We must also thank our Town Council who split the cost of the outside catering with us. (At the Odibourne site during Shop opening hours) We would ask you all please, at the same time to take a look at our database details which we hold for you to check that the information we have is still relevant. This includes your correct home and contact details as well as your availability to give help either in the shop, with shop deliveries or emergency shop cover, with Maintenance or with our Events. Please be aware that it is as important to de-register as it is to register.

Please remember that any rents outstanding after the 29th Sept will be subject to a £5.00 late payment charge. But – if you are planning to be on holiday or simply can't make any of those dates for whatever reason, then contact Lily, and other arrangements can be made. More importantly, please do not pay your rents into the shop as this by-passes our bookkeeping system.

Our Kings Seed Catalogues & Tickets for Presentation evening...

Will also be made available for collection from the shop over those two weekends. You then have until the end of October (27th) to fill your seed order forms in. Please deliver them to Chris at 69 Spring Lane – right next to our Spring Lane Allotment site. Superb quality seeds and almost half price value and your orders are delivered to your door by Chris.

News from our Shop as we move towards October.....

Our shop is going from strength to strength and our range of products is increasing. Pete & Trudy tell us that we will no longer be selling the traditional slug pellets, as per new legislation, but please be reassured, that they are seeking an effective alternative. Stock now includes peat free compost and that is selling extremely well. Another great asset to help everyone is our hiring of garden machinery. A rotavator, tiller, strimmer or petrol lawnmower can all be hired for a small fee. These are accessible during shop opening times subject to availability or contact Pete to arrange hire out of shop opening times.

The shop will be closing down for the end of the season on Sunday 27th October and this is also the last day for Seed orders (as stated above).

Our rules are clear regarding machinery. No starting them up before 8am, Monday to Saturday or before 10am on Sundays. Evenings are flexible, but consideration should be given to young children trying to get to sleep.

Allotment predators... Peter Jones gives the following simple advice to newer tenants who maybe are not aware that we can come under attack from pigeons on our cabbages, badgers on sweetcorn and carrots as well as slugs etc. For the former, he suggests chicken wire or other mesh to fend them off. But when asked for a slug remedy, the obvious one was a beer trap, but then realistically thought, what a waste of good beer! Any other suggestions out there please!?
