## Success and sharing...



Which was held on Sunday 20<sup>th</sup> June in conjunction with the NGS, alongside a number of beautiful gardens in the surrounding area. Once again our rhubarb brought in donations for generous bundles and we had a stunning display of plants to sell to the public, most of which were grown and donated by our tenants at Beehive Hill. Our thanks go to Site Rep, David Hoy and Madeleine Sexton for organising the smooth running of this event and to all the Beehive Hill tenants who worked on a rota to oversee the entry to the site. The day progressed on a pre booked and timed ticket system, with a one way route in operation, so a gentle but steady flow of visitors passed through there at any one time.

And things have brightened up at Beehive Hill in more ways than one, as I understand that our request to Severn Trent has been responded to and the very tall ash trees surrounding the pumping station are in the process of being pollarded. This will drastically reduce the shade to at least four plots in that area, and as an added bonus, the contractors have promised to leave us the wood chippings for our paths from the work completed. Good news!

# On the subject of wood chippings...

These deliveries are now far and few between, so if anyone out there can locate any for us, we would be most appreciative (but not pine please as these are acid).

A couple of our tenants contacted me earlier in the year, as they had used some of our wood chippings as mulch around their raspberry canes. It may have just been coincidence as raspberries seem to suffer from die-back after a few years for whatever reason, but their raspberries did not look happy and it transpired that they had used *fresh* wood chippings as mulch, which can cause acidity to the soil. Raspberries do *not* like this. If you want to use wood chippings as a mulch, please be sure that they are well rotted.

And so July rolled on and soon the plots were flourishing and looking spectacular with everyone making the best efforts they possibly could. The plots were judged on Thursday 15<sup>th</sup> July by Sarah Ridgeway BSc (Hons) MI Hort, from Hinton's Nurseries, and once again, we have tenants Sue (RHS qualified) and Robin Ashby to thank for whittling down the entries from across all three sites to a reasonable selection of roughly the top 20-25 best plots for Sarah. *Please note that the criteria for how points are awarded and cut off dates were displayed as usual on all notice boards in order to ensure that everyone had an even chance.* 

One of Sarah's accomplishments is in her knowledge of trees and she noticed that we now have some banana trees adorning a few plots at Odibourne. She identified these as a variety called MUSA BASJOO, a well-known hardy variety, and they have been seen to bear fruit, although very tiny! However, the frost will get the tops in the Winter and although they will turn a soggy brown colour, don't be despondent and discard them. Amazingly, the new green leaves will shoot through all of this in the Spring. It is advisable though to mulch/protect the roots just in case, although mine survived unprotected! Banana 'trees' as they are called actually have no trunks. They are simply a root which throw out leaves which remain tightly rolled until they are about 4-5ft high (giving the impression of a trunk) and then they unfurl into those massive beautiful tropical leaves. If anyone would like a cutting as they throw out baby plants prolifically, please ask Lily. I would be delighted to share some. Best time for transplanting is in the Spring.

Sarah also noticed that a lot of our pear trees have a condition called orange spot, which is a fungal disease spread by spores. Not an awful lot can be done about it as treatment by fungicides is not recommended for trees bearing edible fruits. The only advice given is to cut out badly diseased areas and dispose of them appropriately (do not add them to your compost). Your pear crops may be slightly diminished, but other than that, your pear trees should not suffer too much, although the frost seems to have hit the blossoms at the crucial time this year as many of our normally heavily fruiting pear trees are bearing no pears at all.

Going back to more unusual crops, has anyone had any experience of growing Yacon? My neighbour Annie gave me a tuber which seems to be flourishing well. We would both love to hear of your experiences, and take any advice.

We have also been in the lucky position of receiving an array of interesting items made from re-cycled pallet wood from Nick Schofield. All the funds received from these go to KATA and we are very grateful to Nick for his continued support and skills. If you pop into the trading store, there is also a board with items available to order and they make great Christmas presents!

Many of you will have seen the start of the new store shed that is going to be built alongside the existing Trading Store. This will allow the main store to be used purely for sales and create a significant amount of additional storage.

The shop will remain trading until the end of October with the opening hours staying as 10am until 12pm.

#### Site news...

Please excuse me whilst I (Pete) jump for joy! After many years of it being talked about, we are at the point where all the permissions have all been granted, the bridge ordered and the groundworks started.
